January and February are important months in the Christian liturgical calendar. Advent marks the beginning our church liturgical year traditionally. According to Laurence Stookey, "Advent is the celebration of the promise that Christ will bring an end to all that is contrary to the ways of God; the resurrection of Jesus is the first sign of this destruction of the powers of death, the inauguration and anticipation of what is yet to come in fullness." Calendar: Christ's Time For The Church, pg. 121.

At dusk on December 24th, Christmas Eve, is the beginning of the Christmas liturgical season which lasts for twelve days. While the exact date on the calendar is not known for Jesus' actual birth, December 25th was chosen which closely follows the winter solstice, the shortest day of the year. John 1: 4-9 reminds us that Jesus is the true light of the world. One of my favorite traditions is when candles are lit at our Christmas Eve services which acts as a reminder of our charge to let our light shine before others and to carry the Good News of Christ into the world (Matthew 5:16). Overall, this short liturgical season is a time to be thankful for what Jesus accomplished by being born in the manger at Bethlehem.

The first Sunday of the calendar year helps us remember the baptism of Jesus. The season of Epiphany begins officially on the Sunday following January 6th and is a celebration of the appearance of the Magi with their gifts. Both of these important days have the function to identify who Jesus was for those who did not know him yet as the promised Messiah. God audibly spoke after Jesus was baptized as recorded in Mark 1:11; "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

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Most people will recognize February 2nd as "Groundhog Day" and revel in the results that dictate when Spring might begin and Winter might end. Lost in most people's minds is that this day is the fortieth day of the nativity which commemorates the presentation of Jesus in the temple (Luke 2: 22-40) in accord with the legislation of Leviticus 12: 2-8 concerning the firstborn male. Let's not forget the hope and joy that Jesus brought to Simeon and Anna who patiently waited to set their eyes on Jesus.

February 22nd this year will mark the beginning of our Lenten season with the celebration of Ash Wednesday. This deeply devotional worship time helps us to look at our own mortality and set our eyes upon eternity and the promised resurrection to be with our Lord.

As we endure the winter months with its cold temperatures, please remember that this is a time of great meaning for us as we also identify that our hope is found in Jesus and that God's grace is sufficient for us! Our sanctuary will be warm and our fellowship sweet . . . come to worship and be blessed!

This New Year Make Stewardship Resolutions by Pamela Jones

New Year's Resolutions offer a great opportunity to set a new goal, to start a new project or to renew a commitment to achieve an objective that might have slipped away from you last year. Most resolutions deal with the most important aspects of our lives, and they usually go to the heart of our cares and concerns.

So, this year definitely make some resolutions, but for 2023 try something different. This year rebrand them as *Stewardship Resolutions*. After all, Christian stewardship starts with the premise that we actually own nothing because God owns it all. Therefore, our time, our talent, and our treasures – and our very lives – are merely entrusted to us by a God who loves us and wants us to use all these things wisely and for Godly purposes.

As Stewardship Resolutions, your goals will not be merely tests of your willpower, but also noble exercises of faith. They will take on a deeper meaning because you are making resolutions as an act of discipleship. You can pray that God will help you keep your resolutions.

Here are some suggestions:

Time: We never have enough time, but somehow every moment seems to be consumed either by the nonstop urgencies of the moment on the one hand, or by mindless entertainment and activities on the other. Resolve to steward your time by planning, setting, and maintaining priorities for enriching activities, such as meaningful hobbies, leisure, reading, prayer, or rest.

Spirituality: We are saved by grace through faith, but we grow spiritually the more we invest ourselves in the disciplines of faith. Suggestions for growing through faith include the spiritual practices of daily prayer, weekly worship, daily bible reading, nurturing spiritual relationships, serving others, and giving beyond a tithe. Resolve to be a better steward of your spirit!

Physical Health: God gave us wonderfully complex bodies. Good stewardship means doing what we can to keep our bodies not only free from disease but also operating in top condition. Your Stewardship Resolutions might call for such things as getting adequate sleep, exercising more, eating better, or quitting smoking.

Mental Health: We all carry stress, but too many of us have way too much! For stewardship of our mental health, we might resolve to play more, to meditate, to pray, to take walks, listen to relaxing music – whatever works for you.

Intelligence: We know that to keep our bodies healthy we have to feed it nutritious food. Our minds need to be fed, too. Your Stewardship Resolutions might call for taking (or teaching) a class, reading four challenging non-fiction books this year, or subscribing to an educational podcast.



Gladine Liner Stellar Mehlville Educator

As a young mother back in 1970, I wanted to raise our two daughters to love school as I had. I already knew how important their individual teachers would be through their formative years. While teaching in the Mehlville School District myself, I recognized how valuable the teachers were who developed the curriculum for each grade level along with the administrators. I met one of them—Gladine Liner—about 1981 after being actively involved with our daughters' grade school.

Gladine was born in 1922 in rural Missouri to a sharecropping family with eight siblings. At the age of 18, she received her first teaching assignment at a one-room school in Texas County, Missouri, where she taught for three years. She attended college in Springfield, Missouri. Later she continued her studies, earning a B.A in Education from Harris-Stowe Teacher's College in St. Louis City. She did graduate work at Washington University, completing her M.A. at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. During this time, she married Benice Liner and had two sons, Ben and Jim.



Gladine started as a classroom teacher in the Mehlville School District in South St. Louis County. She taught kindergarten, first and second grade. Later she became the first elementary school counselor in the district, which she did for five years.

The Mehlville School District was awarded a three-year ESEA Title III grant to develop "Let's Get Ready for Kindergarten" learning packets. In 1972, she began the Early Childhood Program with a committee. She spent eight of her nine years on the committee as Director of the Early Childhood Center. Along with fellow teacher Phyllis Wantland, Gladine developed learning packets for Mehlville parents to use with their four-year olds. These packets helped future students who had been identified as lacking necessary basic skills for a successful kindergarten experience. Workshops were planned and then the learning materials were presented to parents. The district later expanded screening services to include the district's three-year olds in the program.

Starting in the area surrounding St. Louis, Gladine worked on the committee that developed the Parents as Teachers program. She worked with Missouri's evaluation teams on early childhood programs which were requesting state accreditation. Later she was part of the committee which wrote the proposal for full-day kindergarten in the Mehlville schools.

As a result, Gladine is remembered for her contributions as a pioneer in preschool screening and as co-facilitator of Mehlville's Let's Get Ready for Kindergarten program. This program helped lead to the development of Parents as Teachers which evolved into state and nationwide programs.

Her tireless endeavors for the preschool child resulted in the widely recognized and respected preschool programs today. She had the wisdom to know the importance of parent involvement, screenings, and classes for the preschooler. Thanks to Gladine, Mehlville was one of the first public preschool programs to win a national stamp of approval. The children, parents, and kindergarten teachers have reaped the rewards of her hard work over the years.

To honor one of their first female administrators, the Mehlville Board of Education named the street to their Early Childhood Center "Gladine Liner Way." How fortunate the district was to have Gladine Liner for 30 years as a teacher, elementary counselor, grant writer developer, director of their Early Childhood program, and their Pupil Personnel Director. After retirement she served as a consultant in early childhood programs for several Missouri school districts. She was also the consultant for the St. Louis City Summer Early Childhood and Parent Program. She volunteered as a case worker at Feed My People. She remained active at her church and taught classes to train nannies at the St. Louis Community College at Forest Park.

Toward the end of her life, she retired to Oklahoma to be with family. I continued our 40+ year friendship by visiting her and loved seeing how she continued to make new friends, play games, and keep in contact with her St. Louis friends.

Gladine Liner passed away peacefully in May 2021 in Norman, Oklahoma. She is buried in Jefferson Barracks Cemetery, very close to the schools for which she did so much. What a wonderful woman who affected the lives of so many over her active and creative 99 years. She was a wonderful, caring person and a stellar Mehlville educator.
