Pastor David's **Doodles**

On Sunday, April 2nd, the announcement was made that Bishop Farr and the Missouri Cabinet have made a new appointment that the Rev. Dr. Michael Gillen will be sent to St. Luke's United Methodist church to serve as your Senior Pastor beginning July 1st, 2023. For some of you that are reading this newsletter article, this may be a bit of a shock. Lori and I have enjoyed being your pastor's family since July 2018 and believe that there is plenty of evidence that God has accomplished great things in the life of the church over these past five years. I will be retiring after nineteen years of full-time ministry and appreciate your continued prayers during this time of transition.

Change is sometimes a difficult thing to begin to understand. I love the #1 Best Seller book by Dr. Spencer Johnson entitled, "Who Moved My Cheese." To date, Spencer Johnson's total sales for all his books combined equal 40 million copies in 42 languages. Before Cheese, Johnson was already a best-selling author; he co-wrote the business classic The One Minute Manager with Ken Blanchard. It was Blanchard, among other friends, who urged Johnson to write Cheese after hearing him recite its story at social gatherings. Johnson begins by saying he underwent a personal crisis having to do with change and his response to it, which generated profound and perhaps singular self-insight. It speaks to his character that, rather than reveal the personal details of whatever he went through, he instead created a teaching parable about his experiences.

"Who Moved My Cheese" is the allegorical tale of two industrious mice named Sniff and Scurry and two overly cautious "little people" named Hem and Haw who live together in a maze. When the four friends lose the cheese supply they depended on for sustenance and security, the mice move on in pursuit of new fortune while Hem and Haw remain stuck in their old ways. They find what appears to be a lifetime supply of "cheese" and settle down. But the cheese runs out, and the characters must face and cope with change.

As the story progresses, Haw comes to accept the loss of the cheese and moves on, leaving Hem behind to obsess over what is long gone. Haw leaves words of encouragement along the way in hopes that Hem will step out of his comfort zone and pursue a new future. Haw is eventually successful at finding a source of cheese even more abundant than the first. The story ends with his hope that Hem may eventually find him.

Sometimes we act like Sniff, who sniffs out change early, or like Scurry, who scurries into action, or like Hem, who denies and resists change as he fears it will lead to something worse, or like Haw, who learns to adapt in time when he sees changing can lead to something better! All of us need to find our way in the "maze" of life and succeed in changing times that we face.

I hope that you will continue to focus on the bright future of St. Luke's UMC! New leadership will bring new opportunities, new vision, and new beginnings for our church family. I believe that God is still at work even if the changes seem uncomfortable at the time. As we continue to lean upon our faith, everything will work out for the best. The scripture in Romans 8:28 reminds us that "we know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose."

Your prayers and friendships have enriched our lives, and as we leave in mid-June, please know that you will all be treasured as a vital part of the journey of ministry that we have traveled together during our time in St. Louis. May God bless and keep all of you in the days ahead.


